Course Description	<p>The traditional performing arts of Noh, Kabuki, and Bunraku puppet theatre have had a profound influence on contemporary Japanese culture. Manga, Anime films, television dramas draw heavily on this repertoire of traditional theatre as well as on the founding myths of Japan. “Demon Slayer,” the best-selling manga in Japan, was adapted in 2022 for the traditional theatre genres of Noh and Kyogen (a comic form of traditional Japanese theatre) and performed on stage in Tokyo and Osaka. The director of the production, Mansai Nomura, is a famous Kyogen performer, and the writer for the stage adaptation is Yuichi Kinoshita, head of a Kabuki troupe.</p> <p>We will analyse these different performing arts in detail by describing their various components: stage design, acting, music, librettos, dance, masks, puppetry, makeup, and costumes. We will analyse numerous excerpts from performances, accessible via internet links, and we will watch testimonials from actors and musicians. We will focus on amateur practices of these different artistic expressions, from religious ritual to popular entertainment, as well as the status of traditional performing arts in contemporary society and their role in education.</p> <p>Prior knowledge of Japanese culture and language is helpful but not required. All readings and discussions will be in English.</p>
Course Objectives	Learn about Japanese classical culture and its diversity, experience the aesthetics of traditional performing arts as a way of grasping social and aesthetic values in Japanese society, from classical 14th century to modern times, develop personal appreciation of performances, understand of the links between past traditional culture and modern popular culture.
Expected work outside of class	Read assigned texts, prepare assignments, study for tests. Around 1 hour per day
