

Department of Management SPSF Curriculum

Education and Research Objectives

To impart high-level expertise and broad general knowledge and cultivate a capacity to understand and practice management using a diversity of approaches in actual social engagement.

Human Resource Development Objectives

To produce individuals who understand management in its local and global social contexts, and who can contribute not only to corporate management but also to the local and international communities through rational decision-making grounded in specialist knowledge.

Diploma Policy

The Department of Management sets standards for the skills and knowledge students should acquire before graduation as follows. Those who fulfill the graduation requirements shall be deemed to have acquired these qualities and will be awarded a diploma.

1. The knowledge and skills required to appropriately analyze management environments that are undergoing globalization and increasing complexity.
2. The ability to understand and explain the approaches and concepts of Management Studies as well as specialized knowledge.
3. The ability to efficiently collect and process complex and diverse information and take the lead in solving issues challenging society.
4. The ability to respect differences and diversity, engage in open and fair discussion and communicate information, in order to make appropriate decisions under strict constraints
5. The ability to acquire high-level communication skills and contribute to problem-solving by taking the initiative in international forums.

In addition to the above, the SPSF course sets the following abilities which students should acquire before graduation as common requirements across its six departments (Department of Journalism, Department of Education, Department of Sociology, Department of Economics, Department of Management, Department of Global Studies).

6. The ability to learn the basic knowledge on “Sustainable Futures,” to understand its importance, and to take action towards resolving challenges to the sustainable futures by drawing upon their academic discipline as well as from the other five disciplines in the SPSF course they learn.
7. The ability to understand and apply the interdisciplinary perspectives and methodologies, learned in their academic discipline and in the other five disciplines of the SPSF course, when addressing issues and presenting their ideas.

Curriculum Policy

With an aim to achieve the Diploma Policy, the Department of Management constitutes its curriculum as follows:

1. Have freshmen acquire the learning skills, fundamental understanding of specialized knowledge, communication skills, logical thinking, and social ethics required in promoting specialized learning in the Main Core Courses, “Introduction to Management 1” and “Introduction to Management 2.”
2. Have students deepen their expertise in Specialized Courses and Seminars, and have them acquire the ability to solve the issues challenging society today.
3. Aim to foster a self-motivated attitude towards learning and improve communication skills through small-group courses offered throughout the four years of enrollment.
4. Offer courses taught by experienced business managers and practitioners that foster a realistic and practical sense of management and/or teach business in practice.
5. To have students intensively improve their proficiency in English, the language commonly spoken internationally, through English Courses, and at the same time offer Foreign Language Courses in order to have them acquire other foreign language skills.

In addition to the above, the SPSF course constructs its curriculum in the following manner, for the purpose of achieving the common diploma policy across the six departments:

6. To enable the students during the first year to acquire a basic knowledge on “Sustainable Futures” and the

relating issues through the SPSF General Studies Courses, drawing on the perspectives of six disciplines. Based on the acquired knowledge, the students will be able to deepen their understanding in various challenges related to the sustainable futures through Elective Courses in the University-wide General Studies Courses, and they will be also able to learn about the approaches, contents, and methodologies of the different disciplines through Specialized Courses offered by each department.

7. To enable students to gradually gain knowledge of the different disciplines of each Department and also acquire a wide range of knowledge through the courses offered by other faculties and departments which have been designated to offer Elective Compulsory Courses or Elective Courses. Thus, the students will be able to acquire the various perspectives, contents, and methodologies, as well as comprehensive approaches from the courses.

1. Courses and Minimum Number of Credits Required for Graduation

【For students who entered from 2022】

General Studies (Zengaku Kyotsu Kamoku)

Compulsory: 8 credits (Studies in Christian Humanism: For Others, With Others, Liberal Arts of the Body: 1 Credit, Critical Thinking & Discussion, Overview of Data Science, Thinking about Issues, Perspectives and Positionality: 2 Credits)

Compulsory electives: 6 credits (Studies in Christian Humanism: 2 Credits, Advanced General Education Courses: 4 Credits (including SPSF Common Core: Theme Based "Third Year Seminar for Sustainable Futures" 2 credits)

Electives: 12 credits (including SPSF Common Core: Theme Based "First Year Lecture in/about Sustainable Futures" 4 credits)

Language

Compulsory: 4 credits (SPSF Common Core: Academic Skills "Academic Writing 1 & 2")

Specialized Education (Gakka Kamoku)

Compulsory: 4 credits

Electives: 90 credits (including SPSF Common Core: Academic Skills "Academic Presentations", 2 credits)

Total: 124 credits are required for graduation.

3. Guidelines for Course Registration

Please read this Handbook carefully to find out about courses required for graduation and the minimum standards for the number of credits (Compulsory, Compulsory Electives, Electives), etc.

① Precautions regarding the number of credits required for Specialized Education (SE) courses

- (1) Students are advised to take as many Specialized Education (SE) courses specified in Major Core (Compulsory Electives) courses as possible.
- (2) When students have obtained the specified number of credits for graduation in Major Core (Compulsory Electives) courses, the excess amount will be regarded as SE Electives.
- (3) If students take the same course twice, they will only be able to count the credits they obtained for taking the course once toward graduation. The same course refers to; ① a course with the same title, and ② a course that is described in the Handbook as being considered to be the same course even if the title of the course is different.

② Precautions regarding the year of study

- (1) Students can register for any General Studies courses regardless of which year they are in except for Advanced General Education Courses.
- (2) Foreign Language courses and Language courses
Students are advised to take Language courses (SPSF Common Core (Academic Skills)) in the first year.
- (3) The year of study shown in the list of assigned courses and the numbering is the standard for the year of study for Specialized Education Compulsory Electives and Elective courses.

③Precautions regarding Specialized Education (SE) courses

- (1) Obtaining credits for courses other than courses described in the list of assigned courses:
 - a) When students have obtained credits for Compulsory Elective courses in the Department of Management Japanese Track course, a maximum of 12 credits can be counted as credits for SPSF Compulsory Elective courses.
 - b) If the number of credits for Compulsory Elective courses in the Department of Management Japanese Track course exceeds 12, up to an additional 12 credits can be added to SPSF Elective course credits for graduation. However, the maximum number of credits for courses taught in Japanese is 24 (see Distribution of Credits).
 - c) Other Faculty/Department Courses, Courses for Teacher & Curator Certification with course numbers starting with 62, except "Teaching Practice 1,2,3 (教育実習 1,2,3) and "Museum Curator Field Work 1,2 (博物館実習 1,2) and General Studies Course(s) - SAIMS Program course(s) and Data Science Program Courses are included as credits for SPSF Elective courses up to a maximum of 12 credits.
 - d) However, General Studies courses apart from the SAIMS Program cannot be included as credits for SPSF Elective courses.
- (2) Regarding prerequisite courses:
 - a) In principle, Department of Management SPSF courses do not specify prerequisite courses, however many courses may require or recommend prerequisite knowledge. Students are strongly advised to complete PRINCIPLES OF ACCOUNTING, PRINCIPLES OF MANAGEMENT, and PRINCIPLES OF MARKETING before pursuing further study in these fields. Further, students are strongly advised to carefully check the syllabus of specialized courses prior to enrolment to ensure they have acquired prerequisite knowledge.
 - b) Department of Management students who take compulsory elective and specialized elective courses from the Department of Economics should note that prior to enrolment it is highly recommended that they first successfully complete Economics compulsory courses "INTRODUCTION TO MICROECONOMICS" and "INTRODUCTION TO MACROECONOMICS". In addition, successful completion of course "INTRODUCTION TO STATISTICS" is also recommended.
 - c) Likewise, for Japanese Track compulsory electives offered by the Department of Economics, completion of the above SPSF English language courses OR the Japanese Track courses 経済学総論I and 経済学総論II, which are available to Department of Management students, is highly recommended.
 - d) Consultation with your academic advisor or the course instructor is advised.
- (3) Precautions related to Category A, B and C: Course Categories (Compulsory, Compulsory Electives, Electives) need to follow Handbook of the year in which the credits were obtained.

④SPSF Track Research Seminars and Japanese Track “演習” (Enshuu)

- (1) Research Seminars and “演習” (Enshuu) are series of smaller specialised classes across four semesters that allow you to discuss and research more deeply into specific issues of management, marketing, and accounting. While they are not compulsory, they provide capstone learning opportunities in your area of interest.
- (2) SPSF students can apply to enroll in an SPSF seminar or Japanese Track “演習” (Enshuu) in either Department of Management or Department of Economics. Both Research Seminars and “演習” (Enshuu) commence in the Spring semester (SPSF second year) and run across four semesters (ie Seminar/“演習” (Enshuu) 1, 2, 3, 4) finishing in Autumn semester of fourth year.
- (3) To enroll in a Research Seminar or “演習” (Enshuu), students are required to first register through the Faculty of Economics office and to pass their advisor’s examination in the Autumn semester of their second year. Students should follow guidance from the Faculty of Economics and consult with their academic advisor as necessary.
- (4) In principle, students cannot change seminars/“演習” (Enshuu) once they have successfully registered and been accepted, and except for special circumstances (such as study abroad) are expected to complete Seminars 1 through 4.
- (5) Japanese track “演習” (Enshuu) (regardless of language used in the seminar) count towards Japanese track course credits. Students should carefully check the limit for Compulsory Elective and Elective credit transfers (see Distribution of Credits).
- (6) Students who wish to enrol in a seminar/“演習” (Enshuu) outside the Faculty of Economics need to consult with the office of that faculty regarding enrolment procedures and the instructor of that seminar.

Acquired credit will count towards Elective (other faculty/department course) credit only, which have a strict limit of 12 credits for graduation (see Distribution of Credits).

⑤ List of Courses as same content

The courses on this list should be considered as same courses if the professor is different. Generally, students can enroll one time.

⑥ Bachelor Thesis

- (1) The Bachelor Thesis is a peak capstone learning experience in the final year that requires the student to plan, execute, and write a research project under the supervision of an instructor.
- (2) Due to the need to work with a supervisor, Bachelor Thesis is only open to students who have enrolled in a Research Seminar in the Faculty of Economics. In principle, students who join a Seminar or “演習” (Enshuu) of other faculties will not be able to enroll in Bachelor Thesis for credit in the Department of Management.
- (3) Students who join an SPSF Track seminar from the Department of Economics may be eligible to enroll in and write a Bachelor Thesis with their supervisor provided that they meet Department of Economics requirements and receive formal permission from their Department of Economics seminar supervisor.
- (4) An agreement of supervision must be obtained from the professor of the Seminar/”演習” (Enshuu) that you belong to, and is at the discretion of the professor. Second year students considering joining a Japanese Track “演習” (Enshuu) should carefully check which instructors are offering supervision for SPSF Bachelor Thesis and whether any conditions exist before registering their choice of “演習” (Enshuu) .
- (5) Be sure to carefully confirm other conditions of enrolment in the Bachelor Thesis, including required academic standing (GPA) and course enrolment record, and adhere to guidance given prior to the seminar registration and Bachelor Thesis enrolment periods.

4. Early graduation

① Department of Management Early Graduation System

Early graduation refers to an enrollment period of at least 3 years (excluding periods of absence) and graduating at the end of the 3rd year or at the end of the Autumn Semester in the 4th year, upon completion of the prescribed procedures (hereinafter referred to as “graduation in September of the 3rd year” or “graduation in March of the 4th year”, respectively).

② Requirements for Early graduation

In order to graduate early, all of the following requirements must be fulfilled.

- (1) The student must wish to graduate early.
- (2) At the time of early graduation, the student must have obtained all the credits for prescribed courses necessary for graduation.
- (3) The Grade Point Average (hereafter referred to as “the GPA”) for the total number of credits obtained must be 3.5 or more at the time of early graduation. GPA is calculated based on Sophia University Article 55.

③Application

When requesting early graduation, it is necessary to apply for early graduation registration.

- (1) In order to apply for early graduation registration, it is necessary to satisfy the following requirements:
 - a) Upon completion of the 2nd year, students are required to obtain at least 62 credits from Sophia University that count toward graduation.
 - b) The GPA for the abovementioned number of credits obtained is 3.0 or above.
- (2) The procedures for registering a request for early graduation are as follows:
 - a) Download the prescribed Application for Early Graduation Registration from the Department bulletin board on My Sophia (scheduled to be posted in September 2026).
 - b) After receiving an approval seal/signature from your seminar supervisor (hereinafter referred to as the “supervisor”. If you are not taking a seminar, receive a seal/signature from the Chairperson), submit the form to the Chairperson by the submission deadline.
- (3) After registering a request for early graduation, it is necessary to receive course guidance from your supervisor, report your academic progress to the supervisor regularly and receive appropriate guidance.

④Changes of period and withdrawal

Changes to the graduation period and withdrawal of early graduation registration will be carried out as follows:

- (1) To alter the period of a request for early graduation, it is necessary to receive an approval seal/signature from your supervisor on the prescribed Notice of Changes to Period of Request for Early Graduation, and submit it to the Chairperson by the submission deadline.
- (2) To withdraw early graduation registration, it is necessary to receive an approval seal/signature from your supervisor on the prescribed Notice of Withdrawal of Registration of Request for Early Graduation, and submit it to the Chairperson by the deadline.

⑤Re-application

If a student wishing to graduate in September of the 3rd year subsequently withdraws early graduation registration, he or she may register for early graduation in March of the 4th year in September of the 4th year provided that the Chairperson considers that special circumstances exist. If a student wishes to reregister, it is necessary to receive authorization from the Chairperson in advance and submit a re-application for Early Graduation Registration to the Chairperson.
