Course Description	This course introduces students to a contemporary view of Japanese culture and society from the perspectives of pop culture, intercultural communications, media, business, and the environment.				
	 The course is taught by four instructors who will focus on the following subtopics: ※Japanese Popular Culture: Understanding contemporary Japanese society through the lens of Japanese music, television dramas, social media, and other cultural phenomena. Japanese Corporate Culture and Media: Focus on corporate management and culture, media and cultural industry, and strategic communication in Japan. Japanese Postwar Politics and Protests: A brief historical overview of Japan with a focus on the 1950s, 1960s, and 1970s and the ANPO-protests and recent protests against nuclear power. ※Japanese Technological Popular Culture: This section of the course will familiarize students with the historical and socio-cultural context of technology in Japan, focusing particularly on the popular culture figures and the actual machinery of communicating humanoid robots.
