

VI. FACULTY OF COMPARATIVE CULTURE

There are two departments in the Faculty of Comparative Culture (FCC):

The Department of Comparative Culture (DCC)
The Department of Japanese Language and Studies (DJLS)

Certificate Programs

Together with completing the requirements for a Bachelor of Arts degree, FCC students may obtain a Certificate in Japanese Studies or Japanese Language Pedagogy. For details, see pp. 66~67 for the Certificate in Japanese Studies, and pp. 68~70 for the Certificate in Japanese Language Pedagogy.

FCC Curriculum (Common to Both Departments)

The curriculum is divided into two parts:

General Studies (GS)
Specialized Education (SE)

The total number of credits required for graduation differs according to the year of entrance.

For students entering between 2003 and 2005:**General Studies** (全学共通科目 Zengaku Kyōtsū Kamoku) **32 credits**

A total of **132** credits is required for graduation**Regulations regarding courses offered by other faculties** (for students entering between 2002 and 2005)

Students may include in their GS Electives up to 4 credits chosen from courses offered by other faculties and listed in the university-wide General Studies Program as Zengaku Kyōtsū Kamoku (全学共通科目). Within their total number of credits, students may include as GS and SE Electives a maximum of 20 credits chosen from courses offered by other faculties. Required courses in Health and Physical Education and Information Literacy and courses offered by other faculties but cross-listed as FCC Major Courses will not be counted among these 20 credits. (For rules about how many cross-listed courses may be counted as Major Courses, see the description of each major below.) If a student chooses to study a language not offered by FCC, the credits taken in that language will not be included in the 20-credit limit.

Regulations regarding courses offered by other faculties (for students who entered between 2000 and 2001)

Students who entered between 2000 and 2001 may take as GS Electives up to 12 credits chosen from courses offered by other faculties and listed in the university-wide General Studies Program as Zengaku Kyōtsū Kamoku (全学共通科目); they may take as SE Electives up to 32 credits chosen from courses offered by other faculties. Students who choose to study a language not offered by FCC may take in addition 8 credits in that language to fulfill their language requirement.

Credits in the programs for teacher certification and curator certification

As of the academic year 2006, credits in courses starting with the number 62 taken in the programs for certification as junior and high school teachers (教職課程) or as curators (学芸員課程) may not be counted as fulfilling the credits required for graduation. The tuition for these courses will be waived.

Credits in these courses taken prior to 2006 may still be counted as SE Electives.

Qualifications for taking courses offered in Japanese by other faculties and programs

To register for courses offered in Japanese by other faculties and programs, a student must be a “graduate of a Japanese high school” (see p. 61) or have demonstrated sufficient proficiency in Japanese by receiving a qualifying score on the Japanese Placement Test or passing JPN343, Reading and Writing 3.
