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# Facilities

Arrupe International Student Dormitory is a 9-story building located in Shinanomachi, Tokyo. Only a minutes' walk from the train station, and 15-minutes away from the Sophia University campus, it is natural for students to make their way back to the dormitory in between their classes. This building houses both sexes in two separate wings, with a total of 180 rooms. Following the "Share-house" system a single resident will have a room to themselves. 7 rooms make up one unit where there is a shared dining room, kitchen, shower and washbasin. A two-floor atrium connects two pairs of units, uniting the two floors and promoting interaction between the units, making the dormitory feel more open and connected. There are also two private rooms, equipped with their own personal shower, washbasin, and toilet to accommodate students with disabilities.

#### LIVING CONCEPT

[Common living], two-story open atrium facing the courtyard, becomes core space of the community that can be shared by all the residents. It gently connects residential units as it allows communication between students even on different floors.

The large living space, forming one continuous area together with the adjacent dining and kitchen area for each unit, has interior of 4 different concepts: "木 (tree)", "花 (flower)", "土 (earth)" and "草 (leaf)" which are inspired by the richness of nature and four seasons in Japan. It invites students to enjoy active interaction with one another during the residence life



→How each person can drop all pretense and be natural and open with one another.


What surprising things have you seen in Arrupe?
